

Frencing Sastradjaja, born in Indonesia from Chinese background; migrated to Australia more than two decades ago. Mother of two teenage boys, she is fluent in seven languages and known for her passion to help others to reach their full potential. Alongside her husband Peter Sastradjaja, she has served the Indonesian Faith Community in Sydney since 1995. Both ordained ministers planted a new church to serve the Next-generation needs in Denistone in 2015; this faith community moved into the Beverly Hills UC site late 2018 and is known as the Arise and Impact English service.

In 2017 Frencing was ordained and completed her MTh; her thesis focuses on Equipping Leaders to serve Next Generations Ministry; is in the process of being printed as a manual to help Nextgen leaders and ministry. Frencing's passion about helping others is shown in her volunteering at Indonesian Diaspora Leaders Committee for women and children's welfare including the next-gen community. She also pioneered the children's ministry of Wentworthville UC Indonesian Faith Community.

Frencing previously worked as an Interior Designer. She obtained her other qualifications in finance, administration and holds a Masters in Project Management. Frencing had more than a decade of experience as an Operations Leader managing all operations, administrational needs, volunteer training, policy, risk, and contracts management, supporting multiple stakeholders to reach the company's objectives within budget, time and resources both locally and internationally.

We are blessed to have her in the role of Executive Assistant with GRP and believe that she will make a difference supporting the Mission and Strategy of Georges River Presbytery.

INTRODUCTION OF MRS KYOUNGHEE CHO AS CANDIDATE FOR MINISTER OF THE WORD

Kyounghee came to Australia to study Australian literature more than 20 years ago. While studying at the University of Sydney she met and married Junmo Koo who was an assistant pastor at that time, and they have three children. While Junmo studied at UTC and went through candidacy to become an ordained minister, Kyounghee also did a MA and MTh at UTC. She greatly enjoyed studying theology and some of her studies were published in theological journals. She was also invited to present at international conferences.

Kyounghee Cho started her Period of Discernment in May 2016 through the Sydney North Presbytery with Rev Mary Pearson as a mentor. She transferred to GRP in December 2016 and completed her Period of Discernment in October 2017.

Her home congregation of Bardwell Park Uniting Church agreed unanimously to recommend Kyounghee's application to Candidate as a Minister of the Word.

The Candidates Committee of Georges River Presbytery decided by Consensus to present Kyounghee Cho to the Presbytery to commend her to the Synod Selection Panel to be considered as suitable for candidature for the ordained Minister of the Word.

In September 2019, the Synod Selection Panel agreed that Kyounghee was indeed suitable for candidature and she commenced the Foundational Year of her core phase of formation in 2020. She spent her first Field Education at Burwood Uniting Church and the UTC Faculty has expressed high regard for Kyounghee as an excellent student who has a mature understanding of the biblical witness and the breadth of Christian theological tradition.

This year sees Kyounghee commence the Intermediate Year of formation and we wish her well in all her endeavours this year.

THOUGHTS WRITTEN BY REV MARY PEARSON

We are living in strange times and we may well wonder what is going on in our world which, it is tempting to think, used to be so much more stable and feel so much more secure. There have been many voices reminding us that a year ago we were focused on fires and smoke. We were beginning to deal with the virus and had no idea how that would develop. We still do not. Now we are inundated with water and many people have, quite literally, experienced that. Maybe the water will drown the mice that have been plaguing the farmers and causing havoc with their grain and hay stores after a thankfully abundant harvest. What is going on in the world? Even voicing that question can make us feel a bit wobbly because it is really voicing feelings that things are getting out of control. Such a question is also an expression of powerlessness in the face of these big events.

There is also an upsurge in protests about the way power and control has too often been abused and that women have for so long been on the receiving end of subtle and not so subtle male dominance. All these things are taking place in Australia where we know we are so blessed in so many ways, especially when we see what is going on in the world where millions of people's lives are scarred and forever changed by violence and injustice. What is going on in the world? How are we asked to live in the world? What does our faith tell us?


As we come to Palm Sunday and Holy Week, the theme of many of our readings is about suffering. The Psalms, of course, give voice to so many cries about human struggle and pain. They have spoken to human experience down the centuries. The Palm Sunday readings give us a powerful image of Jesus demonstrating how different his way was from the ways of Roman imperial power that was about displays of soldiers riding impressive horses and showing who was boss. Throughout Holy Week, Jesus makes choices of a different way. It was not, as we well know, a way that would keep him safe but a way that would expose him to abuse of power. It was the costliest way possible. He did not do this as a victim. He did not blindly accept abuse out of some misguided understanding of what it means to turn the other cheek. He chose this way because it was the way of humility and love that would ultimately show that God has the last word in terms of power and control.

But let's not get there too quickly. If we keep grasping on to Easter Sunday without allowing the force of Jesus' journey – which is the cross-bearing way he called his followers to take – then we will fail to allow suffering to find its way in and to discover the reality of grace that is woven through the Holy Week and Good Friday stories. We may not be able to understand what is going on in our world, but, however vulnerable or shaken we may feel at the unpredictability of things, we know that suffering has the power to draw us close to God, who is there, in it, and that the way of humility and love is ultimately transformative. It is not just individualistic. It is for everyone and so it brings us together. That is God's way, and we see it in Jesus. So maybe we can turn the "I" of this hymn to "we", the "my" to "our". It becomes even more powerful:

When I survey the wondrous cross on which the Prince of glory died My richest gain I count but loss and pour contempt on all my pride.

Forbid it, Lord, that I should boast save in the death of Christ my God; All the vain things that charm me most, I sacrifice them to his blood.
